1. Call to Order.

President Kevin O'Connor called the meeting to order at 8:40 a.m.

2. Introductions.

The Commissioners, staff, and guests present introduced themselves.

3. Approval of Minutes.

The Minutes of November 16, 2011 were approved as written.

4. Public Comment Period.

Beverly Haddon and Happy Haynes, both associated with the Stapleton Foundation, spoke in favor of naming the branch at Stapleton for Sam Gary, based on his contributions to the original vision of the Stapleton redevelopment plan and his long history of philanthropy in support of children's health and education.

5. Report and Discussion on Naming of Library at Stapleton.

Karen Rokala presented the recommendation of the naming committee which included Sid Wilson and members of the Library's Executive Team. She reported that over 30 letters were received from the public in support of naming the branch after Sam Gary. Only a few other names were suggested.

After considering that there had already been a public request for suggestions and that all the suggestions and letters submitted had been publicly posted, Kevin O'Connor announced that a motion for naming would be accepted.

Karen Rokala made a motion that the branch at Stapleton be named the Sam Gary Branch Library. It was seconded and approved.

6. Report of the President and Members.

Gloria Rubio-Cortés noted that she lives in Stapleton and enjoys going by and seeing the progress on the new branch.

7. Report of the City Librarian and Staff.

- a. Shirley Amore highlighted the following items from her written report:
- The Library launched a new Digital Collection website which has been recognized nationally as being on the forefront of library digitization.

- The Reference Department did a soft launch of the student one-on-one reference research service.
- By the end of the month almost all branches will have Microsoft office. We are hearing lots of thank you's from customers and staff.

b. Diane Lapierre reported on the joint 2012 Fundraising Plan of the Community Relations Department and the Friends Foundation. In addition to the written report the following was emphasized:

- The number one goal is to support advocacy efforts.
- At the appropriate time another group will be formed to support any ballot effort.
- The Library's 2012 strategic objectives and initiatives and fundraising for the Sam Gary Branch and the branch on the Westside will continue to be supported.
- A Montessori school in Stapleton has contributed \$7500 to name an area in the Children's section of the Sam Gary Branch.
- There is a goal to increase revenue a minimum of 10% over 2011. A specific plan and breakdown for achieving this will be presented at a later time.
- Preliminary figures show that the Library's first time participation in Colorado Gives Day brought in \$22,000, with no fees involved, and the first ever Winter Book Sale brought in \$35,000, \$15,000 over the \$20,000 the Library hoped to raise.

Elizabeth Anderman reporting for the Friends Foundation added the following:

- They are actively trying to grow the size of the Board. Anya Breitenbach, former Library staff member and Sid Wilson, leaving the Commission today, are the newest members. There are plans to grow the Board from the current 16 members to 21 members.
- The Foundation is aiming for representation from all areas of the City, therefore any suggestions for potential members from the Westside of Denver would be very welcome.

In further development news, Eleanor Glover reported that the Johnson Foundation had planned to move out of state and take its funding elsewhere. However, they have decided to continue to support Colorado including \$50,000 in 2012 for the Library's Summer of Reading program.

c. Michelle Jeske reported on the Library's Book Acquisition Process. Every few years the Library repeats the RFP process for primary book vendors. In 2011 Ingram, whom we've used for a very long time, once again was awarded the contract but the process allowed us to negotiate an even bigger discount with them – 12-47% depending on the type of book. Ingram also handles the Library's processing of books and some of our cataloging. We retain processing and cataloging staff for special books especially local material which is customer-centric. The Library spends about \$1.6MM a year with this vendor. Gloria Rubio-Cortés supported Jeske's recent presentation to City Council on the contract as a great educational opportunity.

d. Caroline Hughes did a presentation on the Library's early literacy program.

- Focus is on birth to three-years old because 80% of brain growth occurs during this period. Great effort is being made to raise the quality of story times throughout the system based on child development and brain research.
- Outreach to parents and caregivers is a growing trend across the nation because parents are the child's first and most important teacher.
- The Library is providing professional development opportunities to many agencies and programs including the schools, the City's 5x5 program, Headstart teachers and teachers' aides about brain research.
- The Read Aloud Program operates in over 250 classrooms of four-year olds in low economic areas.

- A 'Read with Me' component for newborns to six-year olds was added to the Summer of Reading two years ago and has been growing steadily.
- The Library is working with Bright Beginnings and Reach Out and Read to develop a public awareness campaign about the importance of early literacy.
- The Library is participating in One Book One Denver Pre-School to promote the visibility of early literacy and family reading and get more books into the hands of children.

In response to a question by the Commission, Hughes clarified that funders do not stipulate what materials are purchased and used with young children. Library staff members work with educators and use their best judgment to provide books that promote early literacy skills and supplement the school curriculum.

Hughes is scheduled to do a presentation for the Mayor's agency heads on how current brain research in children impacts literacy and school success. She will also do this presentation later in the 2012 for the Library Commission.

e. Emily Hackett, senior librarian, reported that the Montbello Branch is part of the Learning and Language cluster. There is great pride in all the programming but one of the most popular activities is the Community Learning Plaza which is like a study hall with computers and instructors available. The Plaza provides a place where families can come to pursue their individual learning goals at their own pace. Hackett then distributed a brand new flyer which highlights two individual stories.

The opening of the Green Valley Ranch Branch (GVR) did not impact Montbello's Summer of Reading numbers. There is a lot of cross traffic between the two branches as they provide different material, for example, GVR has no Spanish language collection so they send customers to Montbello. Also, Montbello is open 48 hours per week and GVR only 32.

8. Report of the Denver Public Library Friends Foundation.

9. Approval of Resolution of Appreciation for Sid Wilson.

Kevin O'Connor read the Resolution of Appreciation for Sid Wilson and presented him with a picture from the Western History collection of African American cowboys. In a fond farewell Sid Wilson stated, "The Library system in Denver is the intellectual engine for this city." He noted that he plans to continue to stay involved in part by becoming a member of the Friends Board.

Upon motion by Karen Rokala, and second, the Commission sadly but unanimously approved the resolution

Library Journal Design Institute

2011 Staff Technology Training Committee Activities

Background

- Staff Technology Training was one of the top library initiatives as determined by the Initiative Review Committee for 2010 & 2011
- Reports from the Employee Action Committee and responses to the city employee survey have indicated technology skills & training as a priority for the organization
- As a result, the Staff Technology Training Committee was formed in Summer 2010

Immediate Project Outputs and Outcomes

- Gain an understanding of staff training needs
- Provide a structure that offers expectations of staff technology competence, and avenues for meeting those expectations
- Increase the amount of time staff spend training each other on technology

Activities

- Surveyed staff members to assess comfort level with various technologies
- Developed a living Staff Technology Competencies document that outlines technology expectations for staff at various levels, which includes resources to use to attain appropriate competencies
- Incorporated more technology training into the general library staff training program

Self-Paced Technology Learning Program

- August – December 2011
- 26 activities in 6 areas – Communication, Collaboration, Visual Communication, Productivity Tools, Books and Reading, Fun
- Staff completed these at their own pace, Committee monitored progress, many used for ELG Credits
- Most activities were worth 5 points – 50 points were required to be considered "complete."
- Results
 - o 206 participants
 - o 1,937 Activities
 - o 153 completed the program

Next Steps

- Evaluate activities for the last year
- Include Technology Competencies in Job Descriptions
- Continue to bolster technology training opportunities
- Re-evaluate Technology Competencies every six months

The William H. Smiley Branch Library

Things you should know about Smiley...

It has always been a library! People often ask if the building was a church or somebody's house.



Smiley is a beautiful historic treasure, courtesy of Andrew Carnegie, and named after one of Denver Public School's first superintendents. It has been open since 1918, and has had a couple of facelifts; one in 1965 and again in 1994. She's ready for another one any time!

Smiley is small, but powerful!

A few statistics...

- Smiley's circulation is the highest per square footage in the DPL system!
- Summer of Reading – 1150 children and teens registered at Smiley; attendance at special programs held during Summer of Reading in 2011 averaged 150 people.
- Storytime – Smiley's librarian Dana Richardson's world famous Storytime packs in 40-90 people every time!
- Book Babies – Begun in June 2011, was attracting up to 80 per session by October; a second session was added to try and create balance in the crowd size and improve the experience. There are now two baby programs available with 12-26 attendees per session since January 3, 2012.
- Fresh City Life My Branch programs for adults – Begun in April 2011, are finally starting to take off. Smiley's multiple monthly programs for January are full to capacity with a wait list, or have at least half of the spaces taken.
- Programs include: a traveling librarian series in September, knitting, learning to play the ukulele, fused glass, sewing, crafts, feng shui, floral and cooking demonstrations.

Smiley is beloved by customers of every age! We have elderly customers who reminisce about coming to Smiley when they were children, Baby Boomers who helped in the Toy Library during its heyday, hipsters picking up their holds, as well as young, involved parents who highly value the library and demonstrate this by bringing their children every week to experience our wonderful little place!
