1. Call to order.

President Carlos Martinez called the meeting to order at 8:32 a.m.

2. Introductions.

Commissioners, staff and quests introduced themselves.

3. <u>Approval of minutes from November 15, 2018, Regular Library Commission meeting.</u>

5. Report of the President and members.

a. Finalize 2019 committee assignments

Commissioner Hatcher will participate with Rosemary Marshall on the Juanita Gray Awards committee this year. All other committees are finalized and no other necessary committees have been identified at this time.

b. Review 2019 Commission meeting dates

The 2019 Commission schedule was reviewed and called attention to the January retreat. Commissioners Kelly and Marshall reiterated some of their earlier objections. It was clarified the schedule can always be revisited in the future.

c. Update on Foundation/Commission Task Force

The Task Force had their kickoff meeting on November 30. It is comprised of Commissioners Martinez and Hellmer as well as Pam Jewett, Gay Cook, and Jeff Riley from

the Friends Foundation and Michelle Jeske. This Task Force is a follow-up to the joint retreat last May. The Task Force discussed the liaison roles between the two bodies and how to make sure those are effective and where there should be coordination between the Commission and the Friends. The Task Force will meet again once the MOU is finalized.

d. Overview of January retreat

After the conversation with the executive committee the focus of the January retreat has changed to include more opportunities for Commissioners to provide input and will be a half day instead of a full day. It will be held at the Hadley Branch Library and facilitated by Crystal Schimpf from the State Library. There will be some materials sent in advance to help Commissioners prepare.

6. Report of the Friends Foundation. Jeff Riley and Pam Jewett

Riley mentioned that DPL had an extremely successful Colorado Gives Day. The goal was \$35,000 and \$49,000 was raised.

The holiday lighting party had about 200 people in attendance. The Junior League of Denver was who turned on lights this year.

The Friends received a \$100,000 anonymous bequest.

A consultant has been hired for the feasibility study and they will start work in January to see about the Friends capacity to grow the endowment, fundraise for the bond, and for programs. Riley plans to invite Commissioners to meet the consultant.

In January the new corporate fundraising staff member will start and that work will move fully from DPL to the Friends. The person hired had a similar role at the DPS Foundation which is a similar organization to the Friends Foundation.

Continuing to build out committees and recruit volunteers. If Commissioners have any suggestions for the Friends please let them know. Mathews asked for Riley to send a list of committees.

7. Review and approval of Commission Bylaws.

Hellmer reviewed the final changes in regards to having a quorum and voting. The language clarifies that in most instances Robert's Rules of Order prevail except where the Commission or Executive Committee deems a threshold higher than a quorum is needed. Example: hiring a new city librarian could require more than a quorum.

Upon motion by Lucas and second by Ulibarri the Commission approved the proposed changed to the bylaws.

8. Approval of the 2019 Special Trust Fund Budget.

Amber Lindberg reviewed the 2019 Special Trust fund Budget and called out that the majority of our budget comes from the General Fund and that is a process DPL goes through with the City. The Special Trust fund budget is relatively small and comes from internally generated revenue and gifts from the Friends. Any changes above \$100,000 are brought to the Commission to approve.

The miscellaneous category is high because DPL had a large erate reimbursement, which is primarily used for infrastructure for internet and phone services. It's a federal program that allows up to 80% of phone and internet services to be reimbursed.

Questions:

Q: Under the Friends Foundation Revenue, can you explain the difference?

A: Some private grants expected to be received in 2018 will actually be received in 2019 and that money is already committed.

Q: The amount allotted for staff recognition has declined significantly. Why? A: Last year DPL held an all staff event which only happens every other year. Staff recognition still occurs but at a smaller level on off years.

Q: There is language around the Commission approving any single change over \$100,000. Should there be language to include a number for a cumulative amount to approve as well?

A: That can be added but it was noted for context that the General Fund budget is \$52 million dollars. The Special Trust funds are a small portion of the overall budget. After some discussion it was agreed that the library would instead provide notice of and request for approval of any variance of 10% or more.

Martinez called for a motion, noting the change in language to accommodate the need for a report and approval by the Commission for variances of 10%. Upon motion by Mathews and second by Lucas the Special Trust fund budget was approved.

9. Approval of the 2019 Strategic Plan.

Jeske mentioned that there were no major changes to the Strategic Plan in 2019 noting that work from 2018 needed to continue and is driving DPL in the right direction. Jeske noted the work around equity, diversity, and inclusion. A consultant has been hired to do a perception survey of staff. Ulibarri noted wanting to know more about EDI and where DPL is on that spectrum to make sure everyone has the same vocabulary and think about what strategies are needed.

Last year for community engagement DPL had two incubator sites and this year we plan to add more and go even deeper at Park Hill and Pauline Robinson. Commissioner Kelly mentioned that she read the Our Park Hill document and appreciated it.

The charting the course work also continues to move along and will be part of the January retreat. Jeske then also noted that staffing analysis and work on the bond had been removed and added to DPL's operational work.

Q: Why did you remove focus areas?

A: It wasn't helping DPL message priorities in the way we hoped. Prioritization happens at a more granular level. We still have priorities just realized more nuance was needed.

Upon motion by Kelly and second by Hellmer the 2019 Strategic Plan was approved.

10. Report of the City Librarian.

Jeske mentioned the passing of former library commissioner and president, Jaren Ducker. Ducker was integral in helping ensure the Central Library was built.

The bond work continues to move forward. There is an architect selected for Byers and Smiley but the information is not public yet. At the end of the month RFQ's for contractors should also go out. We have a list of three architects for Central and they are

very interesting. Blair-Caldwell will be working to hire a community engagement firm in February.

Jeske then thanked everyone for their participation this year and handed out books to the Commissioners that she thought would be beneficial.

11. Overview of the 2019 You're Welcome campaign. Chris Henning and Diana Cordova Managers of Marketing and Communications, Chris Henning and Diana Cordova, presented on the 2019 You're Welcome and fine free campaigns. The You're Welcome campaign is very flexible and allows us to talk to our customers about what they are welcome to do at the library and that they are welcome at the library. The campaign will use images of real customers using our spaces. There will also be posters in the branches with a link to learn more about what DPL offers. The campaign will launch in the spring and the fine free campaign is what is going on currently to lead up to it. We are welcoming customers back to the library. There is a direct mailing in English and Spanish to let people with outstanding fines know fines are going away. There will also be a drawing for free iPads. We will also be sampling people who have fines currently to track to see if any of this has drawn them back. We will also be sending posters to display at some other city agencies.

Commissioners commented that they thought the storytelling approach was spot on and engaging and really liked it.

Martinez thanked staff for their work on these efforts.





Denver Public Library Total Circulation By Month







Denver Public Library Total New Library Cards By Month






- Moving to an online system.


