



6-12th Grade Virtual Classroom Visits


Library staff look forward to visiting your classroom (virtually) to nurture students' love of reading, connect students with library research resources, and provide opportunities for research instruction.




What: Visits include fun, engaging elements customized to support classroom learning goals and nurture a love of reading and lifelong learning.




Why: Library staff connect with you and your students, inspire a love of reading, provide a sense of community and support social-emotional needs.




Where: Visits can be pre-recorded (for asynchronous posting on classroom platforms) or presented live for synchronous interaction. Live visits can be recorded and posted.



Who: Visits are provided by passionate staff from a Denver Public Library branch near your school.



When: Scheduling is flexible. Visits are generally between 5-90 minutes and can be one time events or provided on a regular weekly/monthly basis.

[Virtual Student Research Appointments](#)

Our research librarians offer one-on-one student research appointments designed for middle school and high school working on a research project or paper. Meet with your librarian via online chat or Google Hangouts.

Make an appointment with a librarian a week in advance, and we'll spend up to an hour with you focusing on your individual research goals. We'll take you beyond Google and Wikipedia to help you locate the best materials for your project. Our resources include subscription databases, reference books, magazines, and Federal government documents and credible internet resources.
